Reading	Maths Fluency	Spelling
<p>Read for 30 minutes every day. If you've run out of AR books, find something else. It could be an appropriate magazine, newspaper, website, game instructions or a favourite book from home etc. Remember you could read to a sibling or have family reading time. Get the duvets out, build a den and have bedtime stories at any point in the day! With permission, you could also read to a friend or family member on the phone.</p>	<p>Keeping maths facts on the tip of your tongue is a really useful skill to have. Choose one of these to practise today. Times tables should be practised daily.</p> <p>We've spent a long time at school learning efficient written methods and we need to keep practising them to make sure we don't forget them.</p> <p>Have a go at these questions and then check your answer with a calculator. If you make a mistake, redo the question and try and work out where you went wrong.</p> <p>Use column addition to answer these questions. Ensure you line up your digits into the correct columns – check carefully that you've done this.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. $342 + 23 =$2. $364 + 29 =$3. $282 + 135 =$4. $476 + 265 =$	<p>This week's spellings are homophones – words that sound the same but have different meanings:</p> <p>knows nose there they're four for eight ate</p> <p>You may want to be tested on Friday to see how well you've learnt them. If you get some wrong, add them to next week's list and have another go. If these words are too tricky, try the KS1 common exception words first.</p> <p><i>(Note: The Yr 3/4 statutory words can be found at the back of your Reading Diary).</i></p> <p>Words of the week: empathy, grapple and fanatical.</p> <p>Find out what they mean and record it in a sentence. Challenge: Can you drop the words into a family conversation this week?</p>

<p>As usual, there are two images to look at today. Choose which image you'd like to use. Click on the link below to access some questions to help children think more deeply about what they are seeing. (This will help with ideas for writing.) You don't need to ask every question: just choose the ones you think will suit your child best. Who is there with them?</p> <p>Write the opening two paragraphs in the story.</p> <p>Paragraph 1- Introduce the main character and how they got to be there.</p> <p>Paragraph 2- Your main character moves forward and meets someone. For this paragraph try to include 3 pieces of speech between the two character (no more).</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Money</p> <p>Today you are going to create a shop in your home. Why not give it a fun name.</p> <p>Select items in your house and label them with their cost (remember we set it out as £3 and 20p).</p> <p>Once you have set up your shop, practice adding different amounts of money together using the objects in your shop.</p> <p>If you have it to hand, you could always use real or pretend money to help you. This is not essential.</p> <p>REMEMBER – we use the column method for adding amounts of money. If you have pounds, convert this to pence. E.g. £3.20 = 320p</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Challenge</p> <p>Amir has 5 different coins in his wallet.</p> <div style="text-align: center;">  </div> <p>What is the greatest amount of money he could have in his wallet? What is the least amount of money?</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">History</p> <p>Every day on the news we are hearing fantastic stories of bravery and courage. Florence Nightingale was an extraordinary woman who lived 200 years ago and changed the way people with injuries and illnesses were treated. Today, temporary hospitals have been named after her. We also have modern day heroes like Captain Tom Moore who has helped raise so much money for hospitals.</p> <p>Can you write about the different emotions you may have when you hear these amazing stories. You could describe how the doctors, nurses and carers might feel about those they are caring for.</p> <p>As an extra, find out more about Florence Nightingale's amazing deeds. Why is she called the lady with the lamp?</p>
