Imagery

Imagery is a way of using language in order to represent ideas, actions or objects. While it is largely about painting a picture in the reader's mind, using imagery actually means that the writing appeals to all five of the reader's physical senses - not just sight. In other words, imagery assists a reader in imagining the smell, taste, touch, sight, and sound that the author wants them to.

Usually, imagery is written through other literary devices such as metaphors, similes, personification and, onomatopoeia.
